Based on the successful SWADE—Seniors West Australian Digital Expansion concept - in utilising the medium of video conferencing to support remote delivery of programs, ASCCA was successful in acquiring a Capacity Builder Grant in the Digital Mentoring category through Good Things Foundation's Be Connected program.

Due to start in July and run for 12 months, ASCCA and its in-house Digital Mentors will spread their wings far and wide across the State—in person as well as in clusters and/or via video conferencing in the more isolated areas in order to empower trainers in becoming confident digital mentors capable of supporting learners in the Be Connected program.

The Lead Digital Mentor for the program will be ASCCA's Director, Jennifer Willcox, who will meet with the Digital Mentors face to face as well as hold regular meetings via video conferencing in order to maintain the program, confer with the Digital Mentors and generally ensure the program is running according to plan.

ASCCA's Trainer Jean Martin has been selected as a Digital Mentor and newly appointed ASCCA Office Co-Ordinator, Mary Beno will provide admin support as the anchor. The initial team of three ladies will be responsible for the delivery and it is anticipated that more Digital Mentors will be recruited as the program settles in.

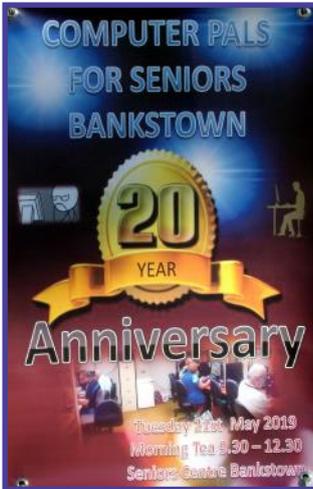

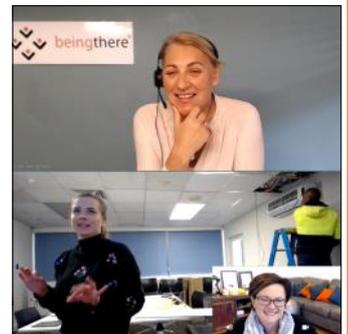
